## The Official Opening

Although Sackville Street began operating in 1977 (with 139 children from Kinder to Year 3) it wasn't until the 18th October 1980 that the school was officially opened. The ceremony was conducted by Mr H.C. Mallam M.P. (Member for Campbelltown). The Principal at that time was Mr J.R. Hamilton. The program included choral and instrumental items by students, an address by Ald. G.K. Fetterplace (Mayor of Campbelltown), remarks by Miss E. Guthrie (Director of Education for Liverpool) and a presentation of the School Pledge and the School Song. Among those in attendance were several current and recent members of staff, including Mr Heeney, Miss Leal (Mrs Mutton), Miss Murphy (Mrs Urquhart) and Mrs Bonney.

The following statement was printed on the Official Program:

The school buildings merge harmoniously into the remnants of natural forest that give character to the school site. The blending bushland, enhanced by plantings of many native shrubs and saplings, serves as a constant reminder of the firm commitment to environmental education that is shared by our parents, teachers and children. Similarly, the founding of all of the other major aspects of the school policy has been a joint enterprise of parents and teachers. The continuing development of school-community interaction is one of the school's chief aims. Further descriptions of the school's style and expressions of its aspirations are contained in the School Pledge and the School Song.

#### School Emblems



Sackville Street Public School's motto is Sharing and Caring. The tradition of referring to this phrase as a reminder of how to behave has been carried through to the present day.

The School Crest was designed by Student Counsellor Samantha Rittson. It contains three elements that are significant to the history of the school and its community.
